SECRATARY'S SCRIBBLES

On Sunday March 9th the Seattle Chapter of the Studebaker Drivers Club met at President Don Andersen and wife Joan's home for our March meeting. Joan provided a wonderful meal which included salad and lasagna, with other attendees supplying, in pot luck style, deserts and such. Nineteen people joined in for our get together. Those attending included Don and Joan Andersen and a friend whose name I did not catch (sorry), Walt Thompson and Dorothy Abbott, Pat Knappert, Mark Kaifer, Eric Larson, Bob LeCoque driving his beautiful 1964 GT, Don Kelstrom, Dave Keister, Ray Keehner and four new members who are restoring a 1939 President sedan but whose names were lost somewhere in our two and a half week trip to California.

After lunch the group moved to Don's garage, a place where productive car projects actually come together. Don presided over a short session of show and tell where he was able to share with us the progress that he was making on his projects. It is always a joy to spend time in Don's wonderful gar-

age because he is always making progress on some of his special cars!

Shortly after we moved to the garage, Angel, the representative for Show Quality Plating, which has two locations one in South Park and the other in Centralia, arrived. We were treated to a seminar on the plating process which included differences between plating companies and the reasons that each step is important to the final product quality. What I gleaned from the discussion was the every step in the process is important, from repair to polishing to the final triple plating using first copper then nickel and finally chrome. Skip any step in the process, or any step that is done improperly and the quality of the final product goes out the window! Samples of the companies product were passed around and questions answered. Although there are several employees who are involved in the production process Angel's discussion indicated that the owner is a hands on type of guy and he does the polishing and repair and

checks each piece before it is delivered to the customer. She was adamant, that as a perfectionist, the owner feels an obligation to each customer and the quality of each piece that leaves the facility. I am waiting for someone to test the waters before I commit a piece to the shop. I have seen too many irreplaceable parts ruined by poor workmanship when the customer used the bottom line as the only criteria used for selecting a platter. At the end of the session Angel passed out a 10% off coupon to everyone present. Mary and I were among the first attendees to depart as we immediately left for California, but with a side trip to Rochester to again run our tour route for some additional exploration and fine tuning of our NWOD route. Most people were still at the Andersen's when we left so we may have missed something exciting but we had a lot of ground to cover.

Regarding the NWOD route, several things might be of interest. The tour route will be a long one by OD standards, about 160 miles. The first leg of our tour will take us to Raymond and the Carriage Museum for a tour of that museum and the

TECH TIP

Oil Pressure Hose Check

O n the more modern cars, the oil pressure gauge is operated electrically through a pressure switch sending unit. This is not the case with Studebakers. Their oil pressure gauge is operated directly with the oil pressure from the engine.

There is an oil line to the gauge that is coupled to a hose which in turn is coupled to an oil outlet on the engine. The hose is easily spotted on the rear of the engine and going up on the engine side of the firewall. Unless this hose has been changed within the last 6 or 7 years or so, it should be checked. The motor should not be running when this check is made. Get a hold of the hose and flex it a few times. It should be flexible and not crack. If it is not flexible but hardened with heat and age, it is time to get a replacement. If the hose is brittle and

cracks, it needs to be replaced before the engine is started again, otherwise oil will leak out of the crack and spew all over the engine.

In the event that the hose should rupture while you are driving, there will be several things that will be obvious 1 - You will smell hot oil.

2 - The engine compartment will be messed up and possibly have a fire if the oil gets heated to it's flash point.

3 - You will not be able to get to your planned destination without delay.

4 - You will not be able to get a replacement hose from your auto parts jobber.

5 - Pressure drop on your oil gauge. Take a moment to check the hose. If replacement seems advisable, the hose can be ordered from Studebaker Parts Suppliers. It is not an expensive part but it is an important part of the Studebaker.

The hose is shown in the Studebaker Chassis Parts Catalogs as illustration 0116-39 described as coupling.

Does this ad look familiar to any of you ? Some of you West Seattle types?

It was given to me by a friend who grew up in West Seattle and says he can recall this dealership back in the day.

Not dated, but the phone number surly puts it into the late post war 1940's. Meant to be humorous to attract attention, it does that ok. Of course, today we look at the prices and go "OMG"!!

Prices on those three Studebaker's may help explain why someone could afford a collection if one got in early enough.

Final thought, I once had a '36 Dodge I paid somewhat the same for, though I sure had no thought of keeping it.
